Howdy fellow Flatlanders. Last write up I asked you to get out and catch some fish and you folks did just that! We start this month's with Craig Born. Craig was out dredging up the depths and stuck a super fat 49 from Waubesa. Bone Lake specialist Frank Wilary adds to the list with fish measuring 32, 44.5 and 42. Not to be outdone by his dad, Ben Wilary stuck his personal best of 48 on a figure 8. He followed that up with a 35-incher. Congrats Ben! Stuart Adrian has been hitting a few different bodies of water and popped fish measuring 32 from Wingra, 45 from Waubesa, 32, 36, 37.5, and 41 during the Lake of the Woods outing. Stu's partner Jerry Oestreich did fantastic on the LOTW outing by poking Lunge of 32, 32, 33, 46.5, 45, 36, 38.5, and 41. As you saw in the previous newsletter, Charlie Wilhelmson stuck his Wisconsin personal best of 47.25 from Waubesa. Bob Cholke was out on Wingra and fooled a 33.5 to eat his topper stopper. Brother Dick Cholke during the LOTW trip had a great trip by releasing fish of 39.5 and 48 inches. Dick's partner Jack Pertz also did well with by boating fish that bumped the board at 33, 45, 30, 32, 46, 45, 32, and 46. The 48 incher was the longest fish caught during the outing. Way to go Dick!! On the same trip, Harvey Gustafson released a 41 and his grandson Derek caught his first muskellunge measuring 46 inches. A Big SALUTE goes out to Grandpa and Grandson. My partner Mike Kruger and I on the same trip did well for ourselves. Mike stung fish measuring 40, 41, 40, and 40. I was able to release a few also with Esox measuring 32.5, 34.5, 37.5, 40.5 and 43. Dick Estes and Wally Haas also made the assault on LOTW with Dick popping fish measuring 46.5, and 44. Wally boated fish of 33, 39.5, 39.5, and 47. Sticking with the LOTW theme, partners Dave Jack and Tim Scruggs popped some nice fish. Dave's fish measured in at 33.5, 41, 43, 44, 38, 369, 40.5, and 36.5. Tim added to their totals with a last minute cardiac fish measuring 39.5. Current Men's Masters Division leader Jeremy Venhuizen has added to his awesome total with a fish from Twin Valley measuring 36 inches. He then went to Lake of the Pines and boated fish measuring 38, 31, 31, 35, 36, and 36. He

followed that up with the journey to LOTW and stung fish measuring39, 37.5, 36.5, 34, and 38. Travis Brady has been hanging around Illinois and was rewarded for his efforts scoring fish that measured 32, 33, and 32 from Shabbona. Greg Lehman also headed to northern Wisconsin and stuck a 34.5 from Catfish and then proceeded over to North Twin and banged a 41, 30.5, 33.5, and a beautiful 45 inch tiger. We will close this month's updates out with the Hoernecke's. Mary and Russ first were out on Lake St. Claire with boating fish of 42 and 41 inches. Russ chipped in and stuck a 45 incher. They them made their annual trip to Canyon Lake. Mary was on her game with her famous purple Mepps and popped fish measuring 34, 37, 32, 30, 34, 39, 38, 34, 34, 31, 41, and 33. Guide and netman Russ also put a few in the boat with fish measuring 35, 36, 33, 34, 36, 33, 34, 33, 36, 32, 34, 42, 39, 33, 38, and 39 inches. Great trip Hoernecke's !!!! Well, that is it for this month. I have been told there are more forms on the way so stay tuned to next month. Keep those hooks sharp and those hooksets hard!

Lake St Clair does it again! 4 guys X 2 Days = 17 Fish

If you are keeping track of the data, that is one more than last year's trip. This year Russ Hoernecke organized another good trip with Jack Pertz, Dick Cholke and Kevin Stenzel heading out of St. Clair Shores/Detroit on Fins and Grins Charters. Jason Quintero wanted to make sure that we got some big fish this year. Well he accomplished his goal and provided another quality charter on Aug. 6-7.

Thursday morning started out slow on the south end of the lake. By 11 a.m. he was pulling baits and we headed to the middle of the lake. Action improved with a 6 fish day. That is great fishing anywhere but not up to Jason's expectations. He hoped Friday would be better – it was!

Kevin Stenzel drew number one for the rotation to lead off of the trip. Luck was with Keven and he was the only one to land a fish over 50". His 51" fish was his personal best and first fish over 50". But Keven's luck continued with a five fish total with the 51", 48", 46",44 and 37". Dick finished with a 42", 38.5", 36" and a 34". Jack almost got in a groove with the 40-inchers. He wound up with 40", 40", 39.5" and a 42". Russ added four more fish to his total with a 47.5",

44", 41" and a 35. Not only did we catch good numbers of fish but also we came



back with more insight of trolling the big water. The two Jason's, captain and first mate work very efficiently setting up 12 rods. The setup included: two down rods in the prop wash, two out rods and four rods on each plainer board. Ten fish came on large bucktails and the remainder on crank baits. The bucktails were usually double tens with three skirts. Jason relies heavily on his electronics for fishing what appears to be a near structureless lake – at least by our standards. Side imaging is key to finding bait fish and the actual muskies. One large screen is dedicated to side imaging. Fins and Grins offer both trolling and casting

charters. They are a quality charter service and do their best to keep you on fish

That's not a boulder, it's a snapping turtle caught by Dick Cholke. Estimated shell length: 20 inches.

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Tournament tales

Wally asked me to do a little write up about my PMTT tournament experience so far and I must say that this year has been an enjoyable trail, to say the least. It is probably because my partner, Tom Rizzio, and I have caught a couple fish. We haven't caught anything earth shattering like others in the tournaments have done, but our catches have made the events more exciting and we have gained new knowledge about lakes and techniques along the way.

The PMTT consists of three qualifying events and a championship event for the top 35 qualifying teams. The first leg of the trail was in April at Cave Run in Kentucky. This event was special because the lake was experiencing record high waters. The lake was 31' ABOVE NORMAL POOL! It was crazy! We were fishing around tree tops, parking lot light poles, fences and other things that are normally way up on shore away from the lake front. It made for some interesting structure targets while casting. Tom was able to get a 33 3/4" fish to eat his Suick during a feeding window that put us on the board. Unfortunately, we were not able to catch any more that may have put us in the money (top 10 for the event). It was very interesting to witness what many Flatlanders have seen over the years when a feeding window opens. The judge boats were getting called left and right as many boats within sight were catching fish. It's pretty cool to see and at the same time you are hoping to get that hit before the window closes. The pattern that showed itself that weekend was to camp on a spot and wait out the fish, fan casting an area that you knew held fish. This was a familiar pattern that proved successful at the 2014 Mille Lacs event where the bite was non-existent. The winners had fished the lake before and knew of a couple good spots. Rather than run around, they camped on the spot and waited for the window to open. When it did, they caught two fish in a short time and won the event. Cave Run was the same. The winners sat in the same spot ALL DAY and caught numerous fish to clinch the win. It can get kind of boring, throwing to the same stuff over and over again, but it works.

The second leg was on the Eagle River Chain in June. The bite was slow again, especially for us, but there are always a few that figure something out. We raised only a few fish and had no takers that could help us out. This was particularly disappointing in that both Tom and I know the Chain very well but we struggle to get a fish in the net at that event for some reason. I guess it's still musky fishing and there is no guarantee. It's very humbling when everyone around you is getting fish and you're notsigh.

The third leg was on Lake Vermilion, a lake I fish a lot, so it was nice to see it on the schedule this year. This event proved to be a record setting event with the largest fish ever reported in the PMTT history (57 1/2") and more big fish than ever turned in. We were able to get on the board

on day 2 with a skinny 47 1/2" fish I caught on a large crappie Phantom soft tail. This fish also got us on the board for trail points but not in the money during that event. We found fish on a few favorite spots that many of us have fished before. Those spots proved to be good during this event as we saw numerous fish only a few feet away from each other on each spot. It made for a good milk run during the event as we didn't have to travel far from one spot to another. Even considering Vermilion gets a lot of fishing pressure, then adding in a tournament, the lake handled it well. There is plenty of water for tournament anglers and non-tournament anglers alike. We never had any issues with getting cut off, it was close because others liked the same spots we did, but we didn't have issues.

The excitement of going in to the virtual weigh-in to see how the lakes responded to the different techniques is always surprising. There are times of realizing you didn't do so bad and times of "holy cow, we got our butts kicked". I feel the two most valuable things in these events is seeing where others fish on the lakes and what others were using to catch fish. Vermilion was interesting to find out that event though we were seeing fish on white colored glide baits, the pattern for catching multiple fish was burning dark colored bucktails. We threw bucktails for a while but weren't getting the results like others were. We started seeing fish on white so we went with it...you never know what these stupid fish will want. In addition to learning new techniques and lakes, we have met some very nice people willing to share information that you would not think someone in competition would share. The enthusiasm for the fish/sport and the genuine praise for those that did well is very nice to see by the contestants. It is a great bunch of people and the tournaments are run very well. Be sure to check out the tournament results on the PMTT web site www.promusky.com. I recommend trying the trail if you want to try new and different water and get a chance to meet new people. Tom and I are hoping to catch a couple fish in the championship at the end of September that would get us in the money for once and can put us towards the top of the "Top Gun of the Year" award. The championship is on Lake Wissota, which neither of us have fished so this should be interesting, too. Wish us luck...we will need it! Good luck on the water!
