Notes from Muskie School

The following are the notes from the Capital City Chapter of Muskie Inc. Muskie School. This is a great day to learn about local waters from the local guide and experts.

Muskie Fishing at Night with Adam Aberfoell Equipment and boat stuff

Keep a clean boat for safety – put the baits away – things get crazy with a big fish – you do not need hooks in the leg.

Be safe – learn the hazards etc. of the lake in the daylight

Have a big spotlight available to let other boaters know of your location.

Only use headlamps when needed – get the brightest ones available

Do not turn on your headlamp when fighting a fish - many fish are lost in that instant that you do not have complete control – have your net man turn on his light

Put floats or straps on your tools – have your tools in a consistent place.

Learn your camera – if you have it set on a delay, when fishing alone – it may focus when you hit the button and focus on the motor. When you are move closer to the camera, you and the fish will be out of focus. Put a light on the middle part of the fish to focus.

Adam puts a sock over the rear light to dim it. Fish with the green side of you running lights to the side you are casting to see the line.

Put the depth finder on low light and Adam turns his dash lights off to maintain good night vision- Red cellophane also helps cut the light down

He uses reflective tape on the trolling motor pedal and covers up the lights to improve his night vision.

Fishing

It helps to fish clear water, heavy pressured lakes after dark – usually the average fish is larger

Slow down both the bait and working a structure. If the weeds are thick make casts closer together – thinner weeds you can move somewhat faster.

Fish launches because of the lights and boaters power loading will stir up the food chain. Street lights also are good spots – they attract bait fish

Adam will fish weed flats typically in the 3-6' range, shallow rocks near deep water, shallow and weed edges. At last light fish move into the shallows or the weed edges. Start fishing the structure and move out as needed.

Baits do not have to be loud in clear water – big rubber works. Vibration helps in dark water lakes. Avoid baits with erratic action or jerk baits. Slow is always better

Adam likes to bend his hooks out 10° for better hooking

Slow, big, straight running baits work best – most hits are by fish following and inhaling – very few fish T Bone a lure at night. Thus, use a longer leader and a steady retrieve.

Change up speed and direction before the figure 8. Make big, slow, level figure 8's – at night, he does not do a 3D figure 8. Adam adds a piece of reflective tape at the top of the leader to know when to start the figure 8 – always do at least 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ or 2 figure 8s –many times you are casting a weed flat and sitting over a break line. The fish may be at the break line and need time to come up and get the bait. Adam will also put a knot before the leader so he gets an indication it is time to figure 8. Keeping the rod tip high at the end of the retrieve will allow the bait to make a surface disturbance indicating that you should figure 8.

Spinner baits are better than bucktails – more weed resistant and the flutter on the drop – he uses 1 or 2 oz. spinner baits. He likes Colorado blades at times in pressured water. He also likes the jointed Depth Raider.

If you have approaching bad weather – get out and fish. Also, fish when the Muskie's are feeding – it may not be convenient for you.

Adam trolls slower at night 2.5-4 mph – he often will use the trolling motor to troll

He believes in the moon phase – New moon is best (dark) Full moon many times kills the bite as it comes up.

The topwater bite is still on during turnover.

Adam will fish at night starting in mid-June and goes through November and to the end of the season. He had photos at night with snow in the boat. September is his best month for night fishing – he looks for shallow water and sand.

He finds 1 a.m.-4 a.m. to be a dead time. It usually starts about 4:30 a.m. in the summer/at the first hint of light and ends about 9 a.m.

Help Minnesota's fishery

From the Minnesota Muskie Alliance Facebook page:

Muskie management in Minnesota is under attack. Without your support our muskie fisheries are in jeopardy. This threat began with a small group of muskie haters on Pelican Lake (one of MN's premier muskie waters). By promoting false information through their lakeshore owners association, they were able to convince the Ottertail County COLA (Coalition Of Lake Associations) to take action against muskie stocking in Ottertail County. They've gone to great lengths to manipulate local residents into believing muskies are destroying their lakes, and they've gained enough traction to pull the statewide MN Coalition of Lake Associations into the fray as well.

Their claims are nothing new. It's the same old story.... "Muskies are eating all the walleyes." Then, when the science proves that completely false, it's "Muskies are eating all the panfish." And when that is also proven false they turn to "Muskies are a threat to public safety and will attack our children." Obviously that doesn't hold water either.

In fact, this is nothing more than a re-hashed version of previous efforts by the group "No More Muskies", but they've found a new face and a new voice. There are decades worth of science supporting muskie stocking and proving it has had no negative effects anywhere in Minnesota, but actual facts are not something these people concern themselves with. They use scare tactics and emotional pleas to further their cause.

Make no mistake, this threat is serious.

In fact, they have allies in the Minnesota Legislature. Senator Bill Ingebrigtsen has long been opposed to muskies, and in the past has made several attempts to hamper positive muskie management. Senator Ingebrigtsen has aligned himself with this current group and is working to help them stop muskie stocking in Ottertail County. Representative Bud Nornes has joined in as well. Many Legislators see this as a "social" issue and not a biological one, meaning they don't care about the science. If there is enough public outcry against muskie stocking, they can and will write legislation to stop it regardless of the actual facts.

The groups' current goal is to stop muskie stocking on West Battle, Pelican, and Big Detroit Lakes. These are three of Minnesota's premier trophy muskie waters, in addition to being thriving fisheries for walleyes and panfish. They also intend to stop any possibility of stocking any additional waters in Ottertail County in the future.

What must be understood is that this is just the start. This threat goes far beyond Ottertail County. Any traction they gain will be used to promote this same type of action across the state. If this isn't stopped dead in it's tracks it will have serious implications for every muskie water in Minnesota.

The only way to stop this is with your support. This is not the time to be complacent. We need EVERYONE who cares about muskies anywhere in Minnesota to take action.

There is a meeting being held on Thursday, October 29th in Fergus Falls at the Otter Tail Power Community Room.

215 South Cascade Street. The meeting is from 6:00-8:00 pm. It is extremely important that we have a very strong presence of muskie supporters at this meeting. The Pelican Lakes association is aggressively promoting attendance by anyone opposed to muskies. We need to show them, the DNR, and the Legislators that we support muskies. Please pass this information on, and ask everyone who can to attend the meeting.

Lastly, please call and/or email the two involved Legislators, as well as the DNR Commissioner, letting them know you support muskie stocking, and proactive muskie management statewide.

As always, be polite and courteous. We win these battles because we take the high road and stick to science, facts, and common sense.
