# Get a deal on great fish-catching baits

It will be Leaders & Lures night at this month's meeting as Gene Seuring sets up a board with some of the best musky-catching baits around. Gene will be selling his baits at wholesale cost and he will donate 10 percent of any profits to the club. That's a great deal for you and the club. If you need a good reel to help you crank in double 10s, Gene can help you with that as well. You can order an Abu Garcia Revo Toro Winch through Gene for the low price of \$225. These reels retail for \$279.

### Get ready for Lake Alice

The next club outing, June 13-15, is on Lake Alice and Lake Mohawksin, which are near Tomahawk, Wis. Lake Alice is a 1,438 acre lake with a maximum depth of 32 feet. Mohawksin is a 1,515-acre lake with a maximum depth of 25 feet. This is the second year for a club outing on Alice, which is filled with all kinds of trees. Lee Bach will tell us how to fish it and how to avoid the trees. Dick Cholke has a map of Mohawksin that he will share with us. Even if you can't make this outing, if you ever want to fish either of those two lakes, you can learn a lot about how to fish them at this months' meeting.

## Ty Sennett - Capital City Chapter of Muskies Inc. - Spring Fundraiser by Dick Cholke, senior corresondent

As before, I write up the highlights of the speakers I have heard during the off season. This is the last speaker of this year's long winter.

Back in April, the Capital City Chapter of Muskie Inc. had Ty Sennett speak at their spring fundraiser. Both Jack and Dean have fished with Ty in the past and would recommend him for a day of guiding. All three of us enjoyed his presentation. The following are the notes I wrote up from his presentation.

Ty believes in a no comfort zone theory – don't do what you are good at all the time – try new things and do things different than the pack – He believes repetition means less fish.

If you really want to dial in your sonar, take a walleye jig and adjust your sonar until you can see it on your unit. After you adjust your sonar unit, you can see 3" perch / baitfish on your sonar.

Any structure is good structure – work it

**Fall:** When the weeds are dying, move to current, the moving water should have better oxygen.

**Summer – LOTW:** When the lake has really warm water temperatures and the bite is off, move out to 8-10 humps and throw bull dawgs.

Don't fish the visual stumps like everyone else. Go to the outside row of underwater stumps (maybe next to the channel / deeper water) for less pressured fish.

When fishing a pocket or weed edge never put your first cast in the middle of the pocket or on the weed edge – you will spook and educate the fish. Cast over the pocket or to the outside of the weed edge and work to the prime area.

**Late summer – August**: Ty has one customer that buries his rod tip in the water and burns double 10's and does really well. The bait runs 3-5' deeper than

everyone else. Ty indicated that it has made a difference some days, but you need to be in great shape to use this method.

**Spring – post spawn:** Look for the best looking outside weed edge. This pattern lasts about 3 weeks.

**Fall and cold front conditions**: Go to vertical jigging – he mentioned fuzzy duzits and bondy baits. During the tournaments with these tough conditions, many times, teams have won on this pattern when no one else is catching fish.

**Fall pattern - Random shorelines:** Ty has found featureless shorelines with no weeds out from shore can have muskies moving through an area. They may be going from the summer area to the fall area. Fish extremely shallow 2-4' and cover a lot of water. I believe, he indicated bluegills are about 2-3" in size and that you need to fish extremely slowly. Some guys will take half the line off the reels to force a slow retrieve – but conversely this makes it real hard to play a fish if you get one on. If you see a fish, go back and work it right away because she is on the move and is not in a holding mode.

## Again, I asked the question "What did you learn or do different to start to catch fish on a consistent basis?"

He did not have a quick answer. He did indicate he fishes new areas, structure, and presentations 40% of the time and known good spots about 60% of the time. He is always trying something new. He even learns things from newbies because they do not work traditional baits in the correct manner and they catch fish. Pay attention to what everyone is doing in the boat.

Ty's presentation was very good and it appeared the chapter will be stocking a good number of muskies due to the large turnout for the event.

### **Boat registration**

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources is no longer sending expiration notices to boat owners. Go to www.dnr.illinois.gov/recreation/boating or call 1-866-867-3542. The process has been SLOW. We've heard stories of boat owners who have had to wait for almost a year. I'll be talking to the DNR chief in the next week or so and I'll bring it up. Keep carbon copies of registration forms you filed or printouts from online registration with you when you're on the water.
