The Chicago Muskie Expo and the "The Question"

A number of the Flatlanders attended the Chicago Muskie Expo Jan. 11. I had the idea to ask a question of some of the top muskie anglers a very simple question.

"What did you learn or do different to start catching muskie on a consistent basis?" Every sport has plateaus and I think certain individuals get past the next plateaus and many of us try to break though through those barriers. These are the answers I took away from the show from some well-known experts.

Bruce Shumway – tackle manufacturer of the marabou feather tail "unbucktails" like the Hot Tail, Flasher and Funky Chicken and the Fuzzy Duzzit Very simply stated "Fish where the fish are"

To build on this statement, **Jim Saric** answered:

First make sure all the mechanical items are in order – all your tackle: rods, reels, hooks etc are ready for a big fish.

Fish lakes that are productive at the right time of the year. He stated some lakes have a great reputation, but not every month of the year. Learn what lakes are hot at certain time frames of the season and schedule your trips around those peak periods.

Mike Mordas of Muskie Train Lures – Guide - Thank you Mike for the large amount time you spent with us.

TOW - time on the water - you have to pay your dues

Mike trolls Ohio reservoirs and Lake St. Claire predominately.

Mike indicated you should pick three trolling crank baits with a tight wobble, medium wobble and wide wobble. Make a chart to know what exact depth each lure is at with a specified length of line out from the rod. Learn how to read your electronics for bait fish activity. He stated when you see scattered schools of bait fish and with occasional humps these are not catchable fish. Feeding fish whether walleye, bass or muskie tend to make schools of bait fish ball up into tight pods. Troll around the pod with the bait slightly above the large arches. If you catch small muskies on one side of the pod, go to the opposite side of the pod to catch the larger fish. These fish will probably not show up on your electrics. Big fish are lazy and the small muskies will push the bait fish to the larger muskies. Mike also indicated, on inland waters, that it is important to learn the seasonal

movements of muskies. At times he will troll with only six foot of line out on his reel/rod when he is fishing three to six foot of water. The fish are not boat shy. Trolling patterns change throughout the season and you need to adjust for these changes.

Justin Gaudry of Mylies Resort LOTW – Presenter at the 1/13/14 Capital City Chapter Meeting

Justin stated: learning your electronics and good boat control were the two things that made him catch muskies more consistently. He enjoys casting but his passion is fall trolling. In the fall, he is trolling in 8-10' foot of water and sometimes within a rod length away from hard structure. Other times he indicated that many fishermen get too close to structure and position the boat in the water that they should be fishing. He stressed when you see bait fish and the proper structure to stay in that area and make multiple passes with varying angles, lures, depths etc. The fish are there and you should take the time to get them to hit. He stressed marking waypoints on good structure.

From the speakers the big take away was:

Steve Hetiing - during pre-front, rain and post front weather, fish fast (bucktails etc.) and cover a lot of water – fish are active, and fish known locations of big fish. When the front clears and you are left with blue bird skies you need to finesse fish the weeds and structure to trigger a strike.

Orange bellied baits work well on Canadian lakes.

Joe Bucher – pay attention to detail

Sharpen your hooks

Do everything right all the time – especially the figure 8's

Do something different in your retrieve to trigger a strike. He is a proponent of long casts and parallel cast to structure. Fish into the wind for better boat control and to better placed casts to specific structure.
